Some Real Estate Deals

For some time past there has been a real boom on in this town and vicinity, in the real estate business and prices are such as to create comment.

During the past week the following deals were made, C. C. Hutchins and N. C. Marion bought the lot on the corner of Franklin and Main streets from J. H. Fulton the price paid being \$30,000. Mr. Fulton had begun the erection of a three story building on the corner which he expected to connect with the adjoining property, building two additional stories over the present store room owned by him. He had a basement dug and foundation laid and about three feet of wall built and some building material on the lot which has a frontage of 24 feet on Main street with possibly 100 feet on the Franklin street side. The deal included this corner lot with the work as it stands and the material on hand.

Messrs. Marion and Hutchins bought for speculation and it is being talked that there is a probability that either the Bank of Mount Airy or the new bank being organized will make this corner their home.

The directors of the Bank of Mount Airy met to discuss the matter and decided not to buy, however we learn that parties have taken a thirty days option on the property.

W. E. Jackson has purchased the store building he occupies on Main street from Mrs. John L. Ashby the price paid being \$15,000. This secures Mr. Jackson a two story building 100 feet long in the heart of the retail section and secures him a fine business stand. We are told that Mr. Jackson intends to put in an electric elevator, modern show windows etc. and use the second floor for his ladies ready to wear department, next fall.

R. M. Smith sold his home on Wilson street to J. S. Bray.

Mr. Bray expects to move his roller mill to a lot adjoining the Smith home and bought this property in order to secure additional property for the mill. After cutting off a part of the lot Mr. Bray re-sold the house and small lot to Pat Allred. Mr. Bray does not intend to build his mill this year.

T. W. Haynes bought the old race track property from Thos. Fawcett, this property is on South street and covers about 9 acres the consideration was something over \$5,000. It is considered a fine location for a factory, convenient to the railroad etc.

Frank, previous to taking the train for her old home near Bloomsburg, Pa. where service will be held sometime Friday at the old Kitchen Methodist church and the remains laid to rest in Kitchen cemetery.

Mrs. Martha F. Becker of Kansas, who was called here ten days ago by the illness of her aunt, accompanied the remains to Pennsylvania.

At her request there were no flowers, she always said if people loved her well enough to buy flowers for her grave she would rather they would make an offering for Missions instead. An offering of thirty dollars or more was made.

A few days before the end came she left a message of love and her

blessing for all the friends in Mount Airy who she said had done so much for her. A Friend.
