**CASHIER GETS FOUR YEARS**

**Hertford Ex-Banker, Convicted Takes no Appeal and Starts for the Pen**

Hertford, July 1.—H. C. Sullivan, former cashier of a local bank, on trial here this week charged in four counts for abstracting bonds, for misapplying bonds, for conversion of bonds and for misapplying bonds with intent to injure, was found guilty by a jury in Superior court late this afternoon and sentenced by Judge W. M. Bond to serve four years in the state prison.

The case was given to the jury at 3:15 o'clock. Aside from the defendant's own testimony little evidence was introduced by the defense before it rested its case at 3 o'clock yesterday afternoon. Mrs. H. C. Sullivan, wife of the defendant, testified as to the visit of Director Brinn during which he stated defendant had only made a business mistake and that the matter would soon be straightened out. Witness testified that Brinn told her he went to the back door to avoid suspicion on the part of the public as to anything wrong with the bank's affairs.

After being out for only fifty minutes the jury brought in a verdict of guilty on the four counts for which the defendant was indicted, and Judge Bond gave the defendant four years in the penitentiary, the defendant agreeing to take no appeal.

The defendant, his mother, two brothers, and father-in-law were all present when the verdict and sentence were announced and both were received without apparent emotion on the part of either.

To all appearances both the defendant and his family have withstood the ordeal of the trial with stoicism. Except for the collapse of the defendant on Thursday afternoon no evidence of feeling has been disclosed, until the accused broke down while being led to jail. He was bid farewell by all his relatives and taken to Raleigh on late Norfolk Southern train in custody of Sheriff W. W. Wright. Defendant requested that he be taken away tonight and special arrangements were hurriedly made. After boarding the train he calmly produced the latest obtainable newspaper and when the train pulled out of Hertford no suspicion among other passengers on the train was aroused as to his identity.

**HERTFORD BANKER REACHES PRISON**

News and Observer: H. C. Sullivan, former cashier of the Farmers Bank and Trust Company, of Hertford, Perquimans county, spent the first of his 1,461 days in the State prison very quietly yesterday and three weeks or more must elapse before he has completed the entrance routine and be assigned to the job that will be his for the four years of hard labor imposed upon him by Judge W. M. Bond Saturday afternoon.

Not often does a convicted man

urge haste in beginning to serve his sentence. Less than an hour after Judge Bond had fixed the term of years in which he must serve the State in penance for defalcations in his bank, Sullivan had asked that he be brought immediately to Raleigh. Accompanied by Sheriff W. W. Wright he arrived here yesterday morning at 12:30 o'clock and was immediately committed to the prison.

First among the things that will be entered upon his prison record will be the typhoid immunization, given over a period of three weeks. During that time he will be kept in Central prison, and later may be sent out on a road gang, or to the State Prison farm. No decision has been reached by the Warden as to what disposition will be made of him. For the present odd jobs about the prison will be his lot.

Sullivan accepts his fate philosophically, and without complaint. He went through the routine of entrance yesterday morning, giving his age, education, business, submitting to the physical examination, got his prison clothes and took his place among the rest of the prisoners. He expects to make a good prisoner and take full measure of the deductions in time for good behavior.

Peanuts worked the undoing of the young banker, according to the evidence at the trial in Hertford during the past week. He was interested in a corporation organized to handle a large part of the peanut crop in North Eastern North Carolina. The bottom dropped out of the market and left him high and dry. The shortage in the bank amounted to more than \$100,000. Its business was taken over by another bank without loss to depositors.

**EDITOR GETS IN BAD**

An Oklahoma editor just about to go to press "piled" a couple of articles, one concerning a public sale, and the other a write-up of a wedding.
