LETTER FROM JAPAN

By Rev. J. W. Frank. In my last communication I left off with our sejourn of ten days in Kobe on our way from Uwajima to our summer home. Not only was our stay extra Mission work which Dr. Dema-ree assigned to me until the arrival of Rev. W. J. Callahan, who recently visited Mount Airy, but the time was needed for making purchases and having clothing made. Here in Japan we do not have access to stocks of ready made clothing, unless it be something like ladies' shirtwaists and such like; but we have our measurements taken and select goods in a tailor's establishment, and have our clothing made to order. Except for the incovenience of waiting, this is quite satisfactory. We have choice of excellent English goods, superior to American made cloth. The tariff is not quite so prohibitive here. Likewise I have all my shoes made here according to meas urement and from the best of material obtainable and by skilled workmen. Those adventages tell in the way my shoes last constally when my ponderous weight of two hundred twentyfive pounds and my activity in bicycling and walking are taken into consideration. I have discarded only three pairs of shoes during the last eleven years, one being the pair I wore when we came here from the United States in 1912, one pair made here in the of their recovery. in 1912, one pair made here in the nutumn of 1912, and one pair of low shoes which was finished up by walking over the Sparger orchard when at home on furlough. 
