**Bishop James Atkins Dead**  
Bishop James Atkins of Waynes-  
ville, N. C., died in Little Rock, Ark.  
Wednesday evening Dec. 5, following  
a short illness.

The bishop had gone to Little Rock  
to preside over the Little Rock con-  
ference, M. E. church, South, and on  
Monday was stricken with paralysis.  
He became ill just a week before his  
death and was forced to retire tem-  
porarily. Dr. H. M. DeBose of San  
Francisco assuming his official duties,  
but on Sunday Bishop Atkins had  
recovered and resumed his work and  
read the appointments at the first  
session. Although apparently recov-  
ered he planned to remain in Little  
Rock a few days to regain his strength  
and late Monday was stricken and no  
hope for his recovery was entertained  
for 36 hours before his death.

Bishop Atkins was born in Knowl-  
ville, Tenn., but for many years has  
made his home in this state. He was  
president of the Asheville Female  
college for 13 years, president of  
Emory and Henry University 4 years  
and also served as Sunday school  
editor for the M. E. Church, South, and  
became a bishop in 1906.  
Bishop Atkins had a very active  
part in the upbuilding of Zuluska  
the summer home of the Methodist  
church in this state.

Members of the family and represen-  
tatives of the Little Rock confer-  
ence accompanied the remains to  
Waynesville where the funeral was  
held with suitable honors on Saturday.
