Extension of Mount Airy Electric System Sought

The citizens of Bannertown and Oak Grove, two of the thriving suburbs of Mount Airy, are importuning the authorities to extend the electric power and light system to their villages. Slaughter, and have offered to extend the system on condition that the citizens of the two villages put up the expense of building the line and contract to light at the minimum 25 homes. The length of the proposed line is one and four-tenths miles and the cost is estimated around \$1,400.

The sub-committee having the matter in charge for the communities seeking power and light will call a mass meeting of their respective villages in the near future to raise the money and secure signatures to contracts.
