Trotter went into the kennel to separate them when

into the kennel to separate them when one of them bit him. He immediately sent the head of one of the dogs to Raleigh for exami-nation. The report was to the effect that the dog was suffering from the disease. He thereupon killed the six dogs that had been bitten by the rab-id ones. Then he himself began to take the Pasteur treatment for hy-drophobia. He does not know whe-ther he was bitten by one of the mad ther he was bitten by one of the mad dogs or by one of the dogs that had recently been hitten by them, but he is taking no chances. Trotter owned a kennel of valuable dogs, his Teddy Burnhill Dan alone is

said by local dog fanciers to be worth \$500. The eight dogs killed are esti-mated to have been worth around \$1500. They are not all of the dogs he owned, as it is known here that he had at least three others out in the country. For some years he is said to have made good money from the sale of his dogs,


