Commencement exercises for Martin Memorial hospital and Training school for Nurses which began with the baccalaureate sermon by Rev. H. K. Boyer, D. D. at Central Methodist Church Sunday night closed with the graduating exercises in the Rockford street school auditorium Tuesday night followed by a reception in the Nurses Home.

After invocation by Dr. Tom Smith of Westfield, Mayor West spoke on "The Hospital as a Community Asset" in his talk he reviewed the growth of Mount Airy in the past ten years which is about the length of time that Martin Memorial hospital has been in existence.

The main speaker of the evening was Dr. James M. Parrott of Kinston. Dr. Parrott is a very entertaining speaker and his address sparkled with witticisms.

Diplomas were presented to Misses Bessie Boyles, Emma Hylton, Ila Norman, and Nell Wright by Dr. M. S. Martin, head of the hospital, and the Nightingale pledge by the superintendent, Miss Lula West, R. N., music was furnished by Miss Annie Folger and high school pupils.

The auditorium was decorated with mountain laurel and daisies and the graduates wore the costume of graduate nurse and carried arm bouquets of daisies.

The Nurses Home was thrown open for the reception immediately after the exercises at the auditorium, delicious punch being served as the guests arrived. Block cream and pound cake were served during the evening.

R. A. Martin Store is Sold.

The stock of dry goods of R. A. Martin, bankrupt, was sold at auction Tuesday afternoon for the sum of \$1,055 to Rev. E. G. Kay, of this city. The stock inventoried \$2,250, with claims against it amounting to more than \$5,000. From the proceeds of the sale Mr. Martin gets \$500 homestead allowance and the costs of the bankrupt proceedings will amount to \$250 leaving about \$250 to be divided among the creditors.

D. H. Cooke to Build Franklin School Building.

The County Board of Education has let the contract to D. H. Cooke for the erection of the new Franklin school building near this city. The structure will have 12 class rooms with an auditorium seating 700 people, built of brick and tile, one story high and heated by steam. It is to be completed in five months. Mr. Cooke is to be paid \$19,000 for the job.

Notice to Dogs—Stay at Home

Chief of Police Lawrence is this week distributing circulars of the latest town ordinance that requires all dogs to stay on their own premises. This new regulation was passed on May 6th and the chief says he and his force will begin taking in charge all dogs found at large after next Monday. The law places a fine of \$5.00 on every person allowing their dogs to run at large. On seeing a dog at large it is now the duty of the officers to take it in charge and hold it for the payment of the fine and costs for a period of three days. And if the owner fails to pay said fines and costs the officers are directed to sell the dog or otherwise dispose of it.

Mrs. Melton of Zephyr At Rest

Mrs. J. V. Melton, an aged and highly respected resident of Zephyr died Sunday at 6 o'clock following a stroke of paralysis Saturday.

The remains were laid to rest in the Baptist cemetery Monday afternoon Rev. C. W. Fields and Rev. A. J. Williams officiating.

She was seventy-five years of age and is survived by seven children all living near her except Mrs. E. T. McMickle of this city and Rev. N. A. Melton of Fruitland Institute, Hendersonville.

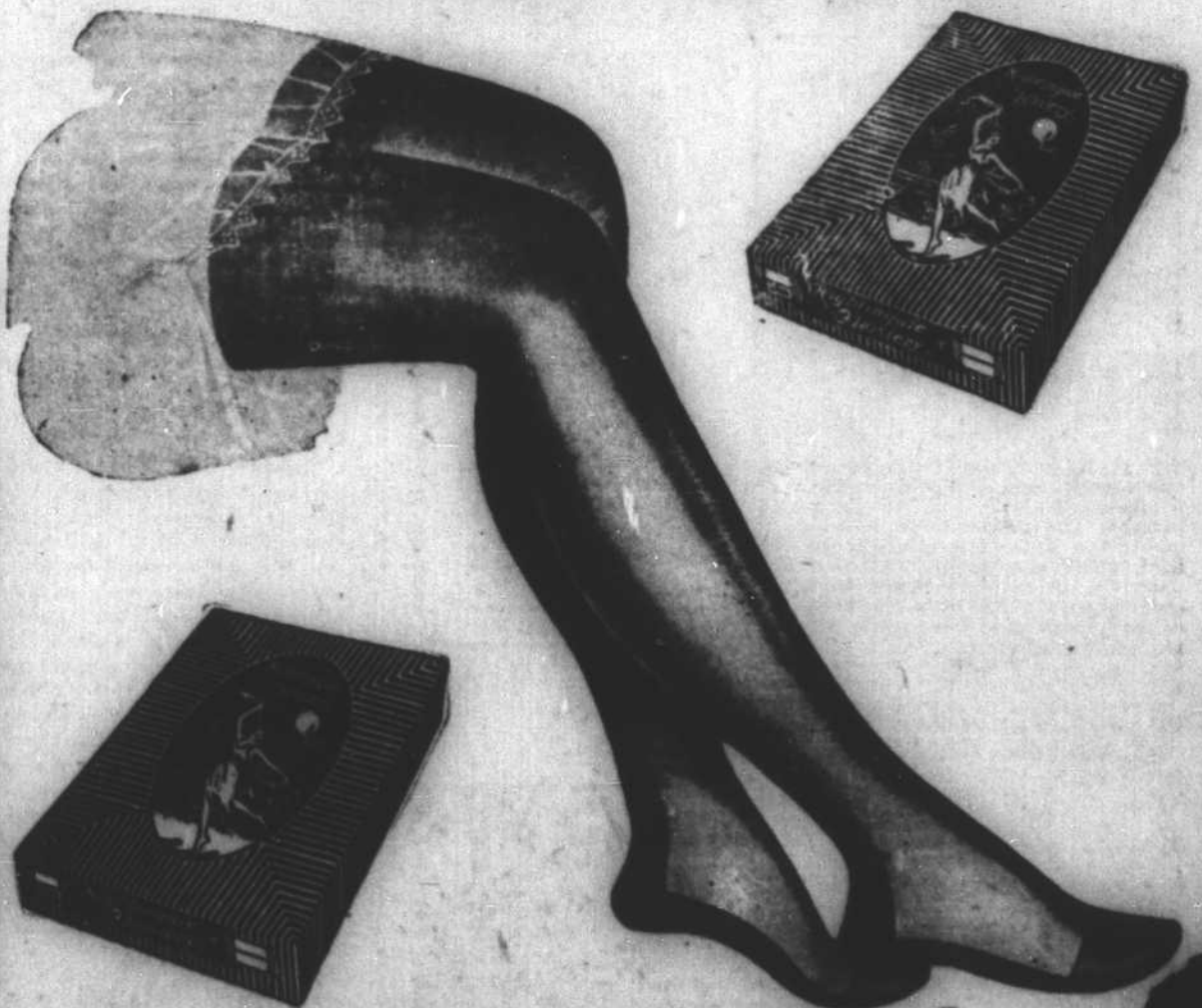
