Work on Moravian Church to Begin Soon

Surveyors have made a contour map of the lot to be used and this has been placed in the hands of the architects who will draw the plans to fit the location and levels. Plans are now being worked on by the architect firm of Crews & Humphries of Winston-Salem.

Those who have this work in charge have decided to erect at once a seven room granite bungalow on the rear of the lot and fronting on Poplar street. The architects will draw the plans for the church, including suitable additions for the Sunday school. It is realized that all this work cannot be done at once, and it has been decided to build the annex that will be used for the Sunday school at once and then build the main church including the auditorium, next spring. But the parsonage and annex will be rushed to completion as quickly as possible.

Mr. Crouch is highly pleased with the assistance being given him and the many expression of good will from the people of this city over the decision of his church to build a house of worship in our midst. He says that already two Moravian friends, of Winston-Salem have donated the cost of the stone in the buildings.

Tobacco Off 40 Per Cent in Quality

Fairmont, N. C., Aug. 5.—Twenty-eight tobacco auction markets of this the South Carolina belt opened today with double sales on this and other large markets. Eighty-five to ninety per cent of the offerings were common primings and the prices ranged from four cents to forty cents. All of the companies were bidding very freely and the farmers were well pleased with prices received here.

Tobacco was off in quality forty per cents. Prices on all grades of common and medium tobacco were from fifteen to twenty-five per cent higher than on the opening last season but little change in the prices of the few good grades that showed up. Fairmont's receipts were around two hundred and twenty-five thousand.
