**OFF FOR BLUEFIELD**

**Good-Will Tour From Charlotte Passes Through Mount Airy—Leave Here Saturday Morning**

Plans are rapidly being completed for the good-will tour that will be made over the Lakes-to-Florida highway from Charlotte to Bluefield next Saturday in the interest of the highway. The plan now is for the Charlotte delegation to spend Friday night in this city. Along with them will be many from other cities along the route from here to Charlotte. While in the city Friday night a public meeting will be held in the High School auditorium and addresses will be made by prominent visitors outlining the proposed highway and its benefit to the sections through which it passes.

The party will leave this city Saturday morning and reach Wytheville about the noon hour. From there the route takes them to Bland, Va., where a meeting will be held with the county officials. From Bland is a journey of about 80 miles to Bluefield where they hope to arrive about five o'clock. There will be held in Bluefield Saturday night a big good road meeting and an elaborate entertainment is being planned for those making the tour. It has been estimated that the number to take this tour will reach 200.

After the meeting Saturday night members of the party will be free to return to their homes by their own routes.
