Wake Forest College to Pay \$27,500 Lawyer Fee

New York, Oct. 22.—The suit in equity brought in New York supreme court by Frank Earl Parham, New York lawyer, against Wake Forest college, was compromised yesterday afternoon. Under the terms of the settlement, which was effected upon the recommendation of the trial judge, Justice Wasservogel, Mr. Parham will receive \$27,500 in full payment for all of his legal services in behalf of Wake Forest in connection with litigation in New York courts. The plaintiff agreed to withdraw his charges of fraud and misrepresentation, which he set up in his equity action.

The suit was brought by Mr. Parham to annul the arbitration award of \$12,000 returned in his favor in North Carolina for legal services he had performed in New York for the college. His original claim against the institution was for \$200,000. He represented Wake Forest college in four suits involving accounts in the Farmers' Loan and Trust company, of the late J. A. Boswick. The first of these cases came up in 1914 and the last in 1922.

The arbitrators, Aydtette, Dunn and Brogden, of North Carolina, awarded Mr. Parham \$12,000 for his services. He was not satisfied with the amount and brought suit here setting up the claim of fraud and misrepresentation.

Mr. Parham took the stand in supreme court today and gave a detailed account of the services he had rendered in connection with the litigation. Justice Wasservogel then told counsel for the college that he thought the case ought to be compromised. He remarked that his impression was that as a legal proposition the award was binding upon Mr. Parham, but added that he thought that, according to New York standards, the legal fee was very small. Justice Wasservogel also remarked that the value of the services as indicated was about \$30,000.

Counsel then conferred, and a compromise on a basis of \$27,500 was decided upon. W. M. Jones, of North Carolina, general counsel for the college, was assisted in the case by Charles Ungulo. The arbitrators were here, as were also President Post, of Wake Forest, and Talcott Brewer, treasurer of the college. Mr. Parham is a former North Carolinian and an alumnus of Wake Forest.

U. S.-PERSIA TENSE OVER IMBRIE CASE

Leader Gets Clemency. Commute Sentence of Hussein, Who Boasted of Killing.

Washington, Oct. 25.—Diplomatic tension is increasing between the Washington and Teheran Governments over failure of the Persian authorities to carry out sentence of death against all three of the men found guilty by a Persian military court of the murder of Robert W. Imbrie, American Vice Consul at Teheran.

Recent advices reaching Washington show that while the execution of Morteza, a private soldier, was carried out with due formality, Seyid Hussein, convicted ringleader of the mob that beat Imbrie to death in a hospital, has been granted clemency by the Persian Cabinet. His sentence was commuted to life imprisonment as was that of a third man convicted and sentenced to death for the crime.

There is little doubt that the action of the Teheran Cabinet in commuting the sentence of Seyid Hussein will be the subject of sharp diplomatic protest from Washington, if such a communication has not already gone forward.

Hussein led the group which broke down the door and beat Imbrie to death with clubs as he lay on the operating table.

Later he proclaimed to those of the mob who could not force their way in that he and those with him had killed the two Americans. Seymour, Imbrie's companion, escaped death by a narrow margin, however.

Morteza's part in the murder is declared by those familiar with the official reports and proceedings of the military court to have been much less aggravated than that of Hussein.

Big Zeppelin Builder Is Now Without a Job

Chicago, Oct. 31. Dr. Hugo Eckener, who with three of his staff officers, brought the ZR-3 to America, said here today that he is in a sense, "out of a job" since the Zeppelin plant is to be dismantled under the peace treaty. He said he did not know what his future would be.

Dr. Eckener said he had wanted to bring a ship to America by way of Asia and the Pacific but that would have required a ship of 140,000 cubic meters, twice as large as the ZR-3. He and his officers are guests of prominent citizens and of the German club.

Murder of Jimmy Driver To Pay Death Penalty

Rocky Mount, Nov. 1.—Cheatham Evans, negro, convicted by a jury in Nash county Superior court at Nashville yesterday of the murder of A. L. Joyner, Hollister taxi driver, on the night of July 23, was formally sentenced this morning by Judge C. C. Lyon to die in the electric chair at the state prison in Raleigh December 12 some time between the hours of ten o'clock in the morning and three o'clock in the afternoon.

Standing to receive the death sentence, the negro heard his doom sealed from the lips of Judge Lyon with no display of emotion whatever, not even a quiver being detected in his composure as the final phrase of "And may God have mercy on your soul" cut the silence which pervaded the courthouse. The condemned negro was turned over to Sheriff C. L. Johnson, who had played a prominent part in working up the case against him and whose coolness at the time of his arrest was largely responsible for saving the prisoner from mob violence, and is to be taken to Raleigh where as an inmate of "Death Row" he will await the date of his execution.

While three negroes have been implicated in the murder of Mr. Joyner, who was lured from his home under the pretense of making a trip in his car and whose body was later found in a creek near Hollister after Evans had opened up and told officers of the crime, the Evans negro was the only member of the trio to be brought up for trial at this time. The other two, Tom and Ernest Lee, who were charged in Evan's testimony with actually committing the murder are being held without bond and are expected to be tried for their lives at the next regular session of Nash court which is set for November 24.
