### Frightened Boys Bury Lad in Swamp After Accident

New York, Nov. 7.—The body of Ernest Schwer, Jr., 13, who disappeared from his Brooklyn home 10 days ago, was found buried in Richmond Hill, Long Island, by detectives tonight, who said they were led to the spot by four boys, who they allege, confessed to the murder of the youth.

Young Schwer was last seen when he went to attend to some muskrat traps with four companions in a swamp near his home. The other boys later told police that Schwer had left them and started for home.

Search for the missing boy had been continued since the day of his disappearance by firemen, Boy Scouts and friends in addition to a detail of police and detectives. Yesterday an airplane was employed to make an aerial photograph of the swamp in an effort to discover if the boy's body was lying there.

Arthur Megan, 12 years old, told detectives Schwer was killed by a .22 calibre rifle which was accidentally discharged, and that he, his brother, Harold Megan, 11, Adam Rotunda, 12 and Charles Hirschfeld, 14, all of Richmond Hill, became panic stricken and hid the body in the swampy lot bordering Maple Grove cemetery.

The boys all of whom attended the same public school at Richmond Hill, were rabbit shooting and laid the rifle on the stump of a tree, according to Megan's story. While playing near the stump one of the boys, Megan said, accidentally fell against the gun and discharged it, Schwer was hit by the bullet and dropped head, Megan declared.

### SUICIDE USES CAR TO GENERATE GAS

Loveless Young Man Found Dead in Vehicle, Notes Telling Fate. Had Been Dead 40 Hours

New York, Nov. 9.—By started the motor of his automobile and generating carbon monoxide gas, Albert Reynolds, twenty-three, killed himself sometime Tuesday night in the garage of his home in Newark.

This was learned late Thursday night when his father, George, a retired real estate broker, when he went to the garage and found his son's body in the front seat of the machine. He had been dead about forty hours.

The police at first suspected murder, but later found three notes, one to his mother, and two to Miss Irene Savacol, to whom he has been attentive.

"Dearest Irene," one of the notes began, "I can't live without you. I love you dearly dear. Forgive me and be happy with Murray. You have made me very happy. This is the best way out."

"Your Daddy."  
At the top of the other note to Miss Savacol, the youth wrote, "I shall now wait for the end. I feel it coming." This note read:

"Oh, darling, I love you so. I want you, dear, and need you more than food. What I am doing is the only good and honest act I ever did. I wish you could kiss me good night and take care of me as you did when I was sick that night at your house. Now I shall find more in forgetfulness than in drink and better peace than in drugs."  
"ALBERT"

The note to his mother said: "Good-by, mammy. It is the best way out. My debts are all paid now. Ask Irene to come to my funeral."

### DEMOCRATS ARE HIGHLY PLEASED

Two Women Elected to Seats in Lower Assembly for First Time in History

Raleigh, Nov. 7.—Capital City democrats are highly pleased over the re-election of three prominent members of the general assembly for whom close slaves in Tuesday's balloting had been expected.

Representative Will W. Neal, the "Ambassador from McDowell," got through by a good majority, although the republicans turned loose on him their heaviest artillery. Ambassador Neal's neighbor, Senator Mark Squire, of the Burke-Caldwell district came through with an expected good majority, although complications in his district had been disconcerting prior to voting day. Down east, in Harnett county, Representative N. A. Townsend, chairman of the house committee on education went over by three or four hundred votes. Reports to Raleigh election day had the republicans on the majority side, and party chieftains were worried over Townsend, but the count showed the most votes for the democrats and restored the cheery feeling at state headquarters.

One of the two women to get seats in the legislature fought her way to victory in a hard shelled republican county, which unexpectedly went democratic in 1922, and upset prophecies by going that way again this year. The county is Cherokee, and the woman legislator is Mrs. Giles Cover. Democratic Mecklenburg elected Miss Julia Alexander, so that the house for the first time will have a pair of women members. The first and only woman member of the North Carolina general assembly was Mrs. E. E. Stafford, who was elected in 1920, serving for two years.

Mecklenburg and Forsyth returned their two representatives, who are battling for speakership honors in the 1924 house. The next spirited contest is on schedule to be staged between Edgar Pharr, of Mecklenburg, and Bob Cox of Forsyth.

Tom Bowie's victory in Ashe, already heralded, was a matter of great satisfaction to democratic leaders. His was looked upon as the signal victory of the campaign, since he had been running the gauntlet for some months.

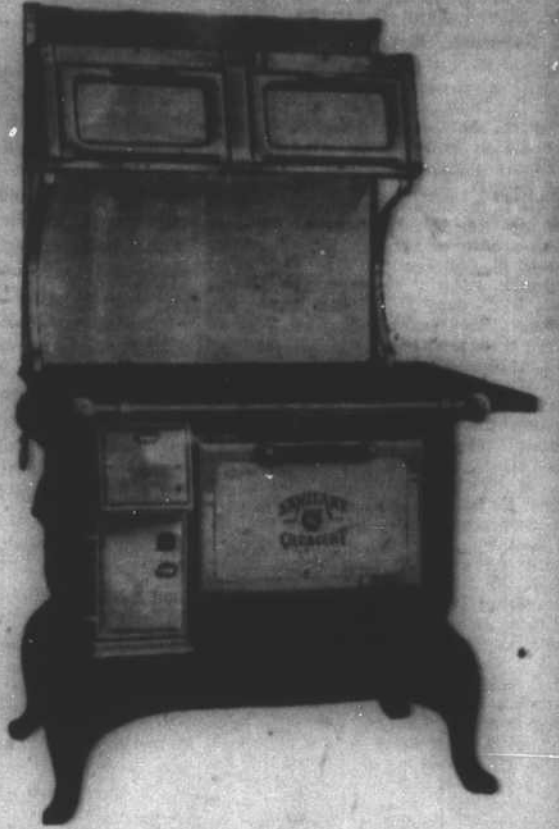
