LEGISLATORS LOSE FIGHT FOR MORE PAY

Majority Against Amendment More Than 3,000. Majority Against, Porto Measure Now More Than 45,000.

Raleigh, Nov. 8.—With voters slowly coming from rural and remote counties, the constitutional amendment providing for increasing the salary of members of the general assembly today was running far behind the other amendments voted upon at Tuesday's election. With returns from 1,393 out of the 1,793 precincts in the state tabulated tonight, a negative majority of 3,561 had been recorded against the proposal.

The vote in the 1,393 precincts, which represented 67 counties complete and three incomplete, was, for, 52,542; against, 97,108.

Small Counties Lacking

Most of the counties remaining to be heard from are comparatively small. A number are reported to have given majorities for the proposition, but the actual vote was not available, in some instances tabulations not having been completed. In most instances the negative majorities reported have been small, but the cumulative effect was enough to overcome the good majorities received in the more populous counties in which cities are located.

Throughout yesterday and up until noon today the proposal had shown favorable majorities, sometimes running well over 5,000 votes. With the receipt of rural counties, however, this was gradually whittled down until, with the receipt of the official vote, reported by registers of deeds from 19 counties, the favorable majority was wiped out and a negative majority established. In only five of the counties reporting late today was a favorable majority shown, the others showing small majorities against it.

Show Good Majorities

The other three constitutional amendments had good majorities in their favor, with about half the precincts in the state reported. The debt limiting amendment in 890 precincts showed a favorable vote of 78,517 to 22,722 against it; sinking fund amendment showed 69,930 for it and 27,976 against in 829 precincts, and the homestead tax exemption amendment in 890 precincts showed 93,623 for and 27,631 against.

The majority against the port terminal bill tonight was 45,561 with 1,310 out of 1,730 precincts reported and tabulated.

SIX PRISONERS GET REPRIEVES

All of the Reprives Granted Are to Men Sentenced to Die in Electric Chair

Raleigh, Nov. 9.—Six prisoners on "death row" at the state prison here received reprieves at the hands of Governor Morrison today, it was announced at the executive offices. The reprieves, it was stated, were granted in order that the governor may have time to grant hearings to the prisoners and make final decisions in each case, when he returns from New York in about 19 days.

The cases of those receiving the reprieves were as follows: Albert Byrd, Lenoir county, found guilty of an attack upon a woman in May, 1924, and sentenced to be electrocuted on August 6 last, but was reprieved from time to time until November 18, next, is now reprieved until December 5.

James McBride, Vance county, sentenced in June, 1924, to be electrocuted on August 29, last, for murder, was reprieved until November 15 next, and now reprieved until December 12.

Austin Carter, Rockingham county convicted of murder in May, 1924, and sentenced to die on September 26, last, reprieved until November 15, next, and again until December 2, next.

Gerson Cotton, Halifax county, found guilty of murder in August, 1924, and sentenced to die on September 17, was reprieved until November 20, next, and again until January 12, 1925.

John Leak, Davidson county, sentenced in August, 1924, to die for murder on October 9, last, and reprieved until November 10, next, and now until January 5, 1925.

Kenneth Hale, Davidson county, found guilty of murder in August, 1924, and sentenced to be electrocuted on October 9, last, was reprieved until November 10, next, and now until January 5, 1925.
