NEEDS DIED FOR HORRIBLE CRIME. Youth Weeps as Electrodes Are Strapped About Him, but Does Not Deny Crime. Columbia, S. C. Nov. 7.—A seventeen-year-old lad went into the other world today by the electric chair route, paying the penalty for attempted criminal assault on a young white woman of Chester county, and one of the most unusual electrocutions the state has ever recorded went into history.

Rouben Robinson, of Chester, followed like a baby when brought into the death chamber. A few minutes later his body gave a jerk and stiffened like a board, and he was in eternity.

"Is you all mad at me?" he cried, between his howling sobs, and his negro eyes glanced the room at the 40-odd spectators to the little tragedy. Assured that none was mad at him, he quieted down and the final episode in his life was begun. In front of the chair stood Rev. J. Dean Crain, penitentiary chaplain, and Rev. Spinck, who is conducting a series of evangelistic services here. Mr. Crain, six feet tall and 72 inches man, spoke words that were aimed at comfort for the negro boy. "Put your mind on the Lord," he said, "He's with you. Trust Him, and you'll be all right."

Tears Rolled Down Cheeks. Captain Evans, of the penitentiary guard, asked the young negro if he had any last words. "I just want to ask is anybody here mad at me," he said, and tears rolled down his black cheeks. The prison official and the chaplain assured him that there was nobody present who had anything against him. "I've told the truth," he declared, as he looked about the room, then settled back in the chair as the officials began adjusting the electrodes.

"You know why you are to die," the chaplain asked, and the boy grunted an affirmative answer. Then everything was quiet in the little chamber of death. "You believe Christ died for you?" the chaplain asked, and a faint, "Yes, sir," came in reply, the boy's last words. The switch was thrown and 1,900 volts of current coursed through his body, and his soul was gone. The current, however, furnished artificial stimulation for the heart, and in four minutes and twenty-three seconds after the switch was thrown the prison physician shook his head, indicating that the heart had ceased to beat. The body of what five minutes before had been a sobbing negro boy was taken into the anti-chamber where it was prepared for burial.

Robinson paid the death penalty imposed on October 6, when he was convicted of attempting criminal assault on a white woman of Chester county. Prior to his trial he confessed to officers at the state penitentiary. His arrest attracted considerable attention, as a gathering of men at the Chester jail gave rise to fear of violence, and the boy was brought to the state prison.

When he was first arrested and taken before the young woman on whom he had attempted his crime, she refused to identify him, her motive being to prevent mob violence. Later, however, when the boy was in safety, she stated definitely that he was the guilty one and that her identification was sure.

SOLDIER SKELETON FOUND IN GUILFORD. Believed to Have Been Killed in Revolutionary Battle at Guilford Courthouse. Greensboro Nov. 7.—What is believed to be the skeleton of a soldier of the revolutionary war, some man who fought in the battle of Guilford court house, is at the police station here, where it was carried after being unearthed by ditch diggers on the edge of the city. Many people visited the station today to see the box of bones, whitened and cracked.

They were brought up by a ditch digging machine, and were four feet under earth, the machine holding them up while digging a cover line. They were deposited with a thud, and the negroes employed on the job left hurriedly, and an alarm was put in, so great was the confusion. A large crowd collected while the two policemen sent to the scene and collected the bones in the box.

The bones were covered with clay and the skull was filled with soft clay. It is estimated that the bones are at least over a century old. In places the bones were badly decomposed and could be easily broken. A pine knot, evidently a remnant of the coffin, was found near.

The theory that the bones are those of a soldier who fell at Guilford Courthouse battle is borne out by the knowledge that there has been no burying ground near the place the skeleton was found, never was a burying ground there. The battleground is not far distant, and skirmishing took place for several miles around the battleground.
