COOLIDGE REWARDS DEFEATED GUBERNATORIAL CANDIDATE

Senators Simmons and Overman Will Not Attempt to Delay Confirmation

Washington, Jan. 9.—Irene Nelson Meekins, of Elizabeth City, was today nominated for judge of the eastern district of North Carolina. The nomination will be confirmed unless all signs here fail. The opponents of Colonel Meekins shot their heavy guns at the department of justice and the White House, and now it will be argued that if the attorney general and the President did not see fit to turn him down the senate can not afford to do so unless some new objections are raised and maintained. An effort may be made to block confirmation because of his known opposition to negro participation in politics until he is better qualified, but this was thrashed out weeks ago.

Mr. Meekins was born in Tyrrell county, February 13, 1875. He is a son of Jeromiah Charles and Mahalah Elizabeth Nelson Meekins. He attended school at the Horner Military Academy, at Oxford, and is an A. B. of Wake Forest college. He was admitted to the bar in North Carolina in 1896.

Thanks the President

After his nomination was announced today Mr. Meekins called at the department of justice to thank the attorney general and then went to the White House and told Mr. C. Bascom Sloop, private secretary, to notify the President that he was very grateful to him.

Senators Simmons and Overman are very friendly toward Mr. Meekins. If some one should ask for a hearing before the nomination is confirmed it would be granted, if action is prompt, but they have no thought of delaying a final showdown. Senator Overman wrote a letter to the attorney general about Mr. Meekins. Senator Simmons spoke to the attorney general and the President about him. The Senators were asked about the various candidates and did not take any part in the pre-nomination contest further than to answer questions.

Will Not Oppose Him

"I have no objection to the appointment of Mr. Meekins," said Senator Overman, who is a member of the judiciary committee, to which it was referred. "This is my position so far as I am now informed: I have not seen any protest, but have heard that some would be made. The appointment will go before the judiciary committee, and will be duly considered there. I see no reason at this time why Mr. Meekins should not be confirmed, although a committee hearing on the matter has not been yet held."

It is understood that some negro organizations will protest against the confirmation of Mr. Meekins. The same protests were filed at the White House.

A few days will show the situation, but the odds now are on confirmation.

Col. I. M. Meekins, Newly Appointed Federal Judge

The announcement from Washington of the appointment of Col. I. M. Meekins as Federal Judge for the Eastern district of this state will be of much interest to the people of this county. Col. Meekins was the Republican candidate for Governor last fall and during his itinerary of the state made three speeches in this county. His addresses were of a high order and his ability as an orator was recognized by people of both political parties. His character stands above

reproach and no political opponent has ever attempted to attack his conduct in private or public life.

During the campaign he had as his manager Judge A. E. Tilley of this city. Judge Tilley accompanied him on his speaking tour and ably reported his speeches to the press of the state. Since Col. Meekins appoints the clerk of his court Judge Tilley has been mentioned as a probable appointee.

Diphtheria Prevention. To Parents or Guardians: It has been found by use of the Schick test that over 50 per cent of school children would take Diphtheria if exposed. The Schick test is made by placing one drop of a liquid in the skin, and is perfectly harmless, and does not cause pain. Children who would take Diphtheria can be prevented from taking it by being vaccinated (Toxin-Antitoxin). Eighty-five per cent are protected by three doses, the remaining 15 per cent require more, therefore it is best to give the Schick test the second time after six months to determine whether or not the child is protected by the first vaccination. The vaccine may make the arm red, which is believed to indicate that the child needs the vaccine. The County Health Department wants to give all school children the Schick test and vaccinate those who need it. This treatment is now being given the children in the schools of the county and the public can also get the treatment by calling at the health office in Mount Airy on any Saturday from 9 to 5 o'clock.
