**WOULD HAVE AUTO MECHANICS LICENSED**

Representative Barker of Surry, is Drawing Up Bill to be Introduced in House

Raleigh, Jan. 8.—Representative Harry H. Barker, of Surry, who is the first Democratic member from Surry county in 32 years, will offer to the general assembly a bill designed to improve the automobile service throughout the state by requiring mechanics who work on them to be licensed by the state.

Mr. Barker has not worked out the features of his bill, but in the main it purports to protect the owners of automobiles against jackleg workmen. The Surry man has lost one of his machines by a tinkerer who knew nothing about it. The measure would require ample evidence of the fitness of any man who offers to doctor the motor or monkey with the machinery.

This Surry representative is now studying to get his measure into some sort of shape. He believes that it will reduce the actual cost of upkeep in providing honest and capable workmen, not to mention the salvaging of machines sent to the scrap heap by ignorant tinkerers.

**NO TARIFF CHANGES LIKELY IN 4 YEARS**

Committee Turns Down Request to Transfer Cattle Across Mexican Border

Washington, Jan. 9.—The Fordney-McCumber Tariff will remain unchanged for the next four years, or during the period of the Administration of President Coolidge. There will be no tariff tinkering. No changes in schedules and no attempts to alter in any way the schedules contained in the present law.

This was indicated to-day when the Ways and Means Committee turned down a proposal of Representative Garner for a slight change which would permit the transfer of cattle across the Texas-Mexican border. The committee refused to take action, saying it was undesirable as establishing a precedent which might be used to bring about other changes.

Chairman Green has refused hearings on proposed changes. It was plainly intimated the committee was acting in accord with the wishes of the Administration.

The decision is in line with the attitude during the campaign of Administration leaders, who defended the Fordney-McCumber Tariff from the stump and refused to yield to objections coming from the Northwestern farmers.

It is maintained by Republican leaders in the House that it is better for business to be assured there will be no tariff changes rather than to remedy mistakes that may have been made. The authority granted the President to increase or lower schedules from time to time is regarded as a sufficient protection against emergencies.

**Would Require Pasteur Treatment of All Dogs**

Raleigh, Jan. 10.—Compulsory treatment of all dogs in the State with the Pasteur serum twice each year will be required under an act to prevent rabies which will be presented at this session by Senator W. B. McQueen, of Hoke.

All dog owners would be required to secure from the State Laboratory of Hygiene the serum which can be administered at home, and treat their dogs twice a year. After each treatment a tag bearing the date of treatment must be placed on the dog and any untagged animal could be shot as a mad dog at present. Violation of the act would be a misdemeanor.

About a year ago a friend and neighbor of Senator McQueen blew his brains out with a shot gun when he realized that he had contracted hydrophobia and feared that he would endanger the lives of his wife and children.

**LETTER FROM JAPAN**

After a long delay I will now use some more of the good "Hammermill Bond" typewriting paper obtained from the News office in letting our Surry County friends know something of what we are doing. We are glad to report that we are enjoying good health and that we are happy in our work.

As usual, we spent our summer vacation at Ninooka, a summer resort near Gotemba and near the base of Mount Fuji, where the unusually good weather permitted us to look upon the banks of perpetual snow far up the sides of this peerless mountain. Contrary to our custom, we rented our summer home, and had charge of the "Gotemba Club", a kind of private hotel, where over two thousand meals were served without my wife having to purchase a single article of food or prepare the menu for a single time, thanks to the efficiency of the Japanese caterer who has for many years furnished the meals by contract for a fixed price per meal. Coming in contact with the guests, some missionaries and teachers of Japan and travellers and business people, was a helpful contrast to living here in Uwajima so far removed from others of our own race; and the change of responsibilities was very refreshing to Mrs. Frank. I enjoyed keeping accounts, collecting bills, etc., but had my greatest anxiety in looking after the waterworks. The fine spring up in the mountains which had supplied the waterworks used by the Club and a number of private homes entirely failed after the great earthquake. We harnessed another spring, but found the supply inadequate. Water is one of the very valuable assets in Japan, especially on account of a considerable quantity needed to flood the rice-fields; and it is natural for quarrels and even feuds to arise over water privileges, just as Americans fuss over dogs and lines between farms.

We entertained the men, women and children of the Southern Presbyterian Mission in the Club while attending their annual meeting in July, and we were delighted with their culture and warm-hearted spirit. Some of them have been among our very best friends for many years, our friendship with a few of the families dating back for nearly a quarter of a century. We are glad to know the others. Their formal vote of thanks to the management of the Club was refreshing; and their decision to come back again next year was gratifying. The coming of the Scotch Presbyterians to America was one of the things which helped to hold the country against infidelity and political tyranny, despite the fact that Flora McDonald of Revolutionary fame held with the Tories in loyalty to the English Crown. She had to leave North Carolina after the independence of the thirteen states was achieved; but she went to Canada where her descendants have honored their race and their country. And the Presbyterians were induced to change the name of their school at Red Springs, N. C., to Flora McDonald College, through the influence of Dr. McDonald, of Toronto, Canada, a descendant of Flora McDonald and erstwhile virile editor of a great daily. On finding that I was from North Carolina Dr. McDonald expressed to me his regard for the Old North State, and told me the story of his interest in the Presbyterian school referred to above. It is interesting to recall how kindly he spoke of the United States, the nation which exiled his noted ancestor for her loyalty to England. But we are living in a great age, an age more shot through with love and toleration than any the world has ever known despite the effects of the World War.
