1. 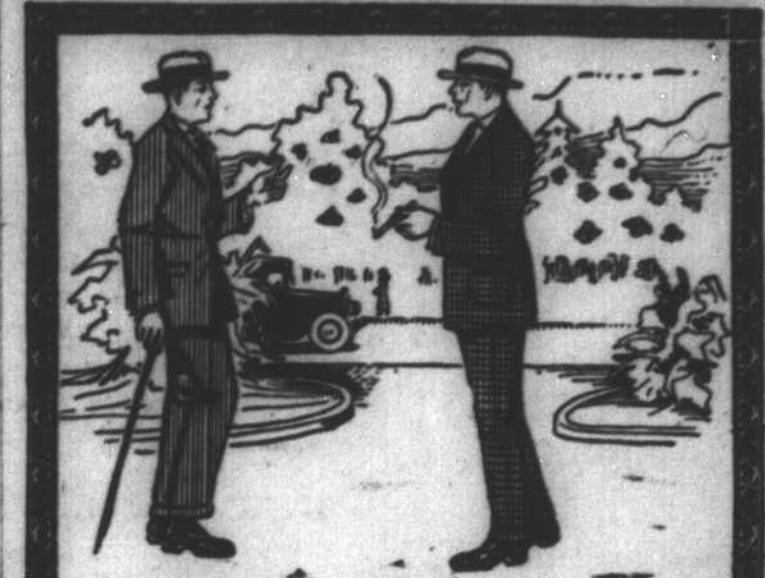
