### In the Recorder's Court

Judge Lowelyn had many knotty problems to solve in his court Monday—young boys before him charged with thefts and various crimes that are considered serious against society and yet they were committed by parties who threw themselves on the mercy of the court which made the disposition of the cases in a satisfactory manner a hard problem.

Hattie Bowman was sentenced to 30 days in jail on a vagrancy charge and appealed to Dobson court.

W. H. Fallon, who is in the habit of getting drunk, was given a 30 day jail sentence. He appeal d.

Lester Towe and Henry Berry, two youths got into court in a peculiar way and now they must answer to the Superior court on a felony charge. The boys were attending the Fiddlers convention at the Franklin school house last Friday and during the evening decided to take a ride in the country. Out into the yard they went and took the Ford touring car belonging to J. W. Barker, of this city. They rode over about White Plains and then out to Cross Roads and were on their way back to the school house, expecting to arrive before the convention was over. On their return had luck overtook them when they ran into another car and wrecked the car belonging to Mr. Barker. The boys were arrested and must now stand trial for larceny of an automobile.

The boys have no money to satisfy Mr. Barker for the damage to his car, and their parents are hard working people who are in the same condition, so when the case comes before a Superior court judge he will face the problem of what to do with these boys who let their better judgment leave leave them for a short time.

Oscar Reynolds, colored, was sent to the roads for six months for an assault on E. R. Short, road builder. The negro had been discharged which brought on threats against the life of Mr. Short. An appeal was taken.

Carl Jones was found not guilty of reckless driving. A few weeks ago he passed a car over near the Patrick line and about the time the cars passed the car of a Mr. Tilley containing several girls turned over, painfully injuring one of the party. Jones was charged with running into them and causing the wreck. The testimony was conflicting and the court gave the defendant the benefit of the doubt and declared him not guilty.

The jury asked for by Ralph Lowe and Forest Heath took only a few minutes to convict them of a liquor charge. Both received 12 months suspended sentences and paid a fine of \$25 each and the cost. The road sentence is to take effect if they are found drinking, acting in a disorderly way, and in any way violating any of the laws of the state within the next two years.

Earl Oakley was fined \$50 and the cost for the larceny of several hens from George Creed.

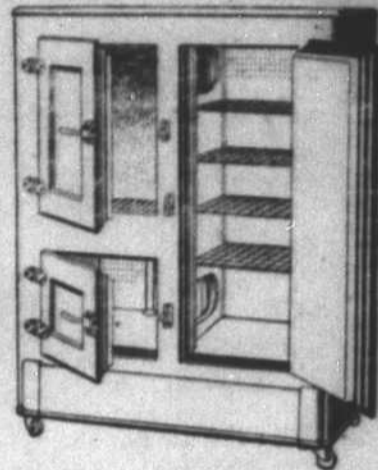
