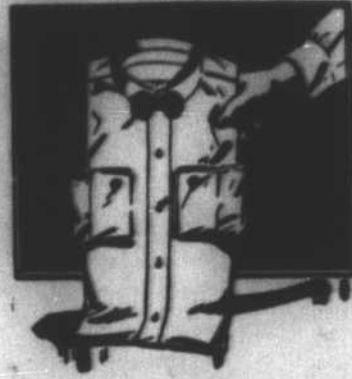

County Welfare Officer's Work in February

The following facts regarding the work of C. G. Robertson, County Welfare Officer for Surry County are submitted to give the public an idea of the efforts being made in the county to care for the poor, see that the children of the county receive an education and to prevent juvenile offenders from becoming criminals and making trouble for themselves and the state in years to come.

Fourteen white boys, 3 white girls, and one negro boy were continued from the January Juvenile Court cases for further supervision or investigation; 9 new cases developed during February. Seven cases were handled by the Welfare officer, 2 officially by the Juvenile court, five were reprimanded and warned, 1 continued on probation, 2 handled through the parents, others were continued.

In the matter of school attendance 74 cases were carried from January and 125 reported in February by teachers for failure to attend school without good reason. Of these 126 were returned to school, 14 were excused from school attendance and in five cases parents were prosecuted for their failure to comply with the compulsory school law.

In caring for the poor 5 cases were investigated, 1 placed on the poor list and 1 removed from the list. Eight cases were investigated for the North Carolina Children's Home Society, 1 for the Winston-Salem Welfare department and 1 for the Rehabilitation department in Raleigh.

The work of the Welfare Officer for February required writing 132 letters, 113 visits, 14 visits to schools and 676 miles traveled during the month.
