Sentence of T. P. Jimison Changed to Fine of \$500

Ex-Governor Morrison Makes Eloquent Plea for Mitigation. Ten Witnesses, Five of the Preachers, Testify to Past Character of Accused.

Charlotte, April 15.—"Because he violated the law with his eyes open I'll fine him \$500," declared Judge H. Williams in recorder's court yesterday at the conclusion of a picturesque retrial, before a crowded courtroom,

The ruling came after an eloquent appeal for mitigation of sentence had been made by Ex-governor Cameron Morrison and the defense had introduced the presiding elder of the Charlotte district, M. E. church, four other Methodist ministers, the chairman of the board of stewards of the church in Spencer, where Mr. Jimison held his latest pastorate,

Judge Williams said, in pronouncing sentence, that he had no apology to make for the fact that a retrial had been granted, for there was precedent for it in his court, and stated that testimony introduced yesterday had placed the accused in a more favorable light.

R. A. Wellons, who represented the state in the absence of Solicitor McAuley, who was sick, put only two witnesses on the stand, R. B. Ramsey and R. G. Cates, the detectives who made the arrest. Only one question was asked. Each of the state's witnesses was asked to describe the condition of the accused at the time of the arrest at 4:30 on the morning of April 3.

After the ten character witnesses had been examined, Mr. Jimison took the stand in his own behalf. He testified that he was 38 years old, was married, had one child, that he was born in Buncombe county and had been the pastor of six Methodist churches, at St. Charles, Va., Horse-shoe, Mont., Deer Lodge, Mont., at Mount Airy, Winston-Salem, and Spencer.

The witness was asked how he happened to have two suitcases containing a gallon jug in one and seven pints in the other. He replied that the liquor had come from Rowan county; that a friend had told him that he had been into the mountains and that someone had given him the liquor; and the witness said that this friend had given the liquor to him to deliver to friends in Charlotte.

Mr. Jimison denied that he knew that the suitcases contained liquor when given to him, but, on cross-examination by Mr. Wellons, admitted that he thought that the presents he had been asked to deliver in Charlotte were liquor.

Mr. Jimison said that he was not a habitual drinker, but had "used it some." He said that he had been drunk probably a half dozen times in his life, but denied that he had ever received compensation or been a party to traffic in liquor. He testified that he had taken one drink at about 12:30 on the morning of his arrest.

The outstanding feature of the trial was the impassioned appeal of Ex-Governor Cameron Morrison for a mitigated sentence, in which he asked for a judgment seasoned with common sense and glorified with mercy.

Col. T. L. Kirkpatrick, who followed Mr. Morrison, stated that if there was no other testimony but that of the preachers, the court should modify the punishment. He said that the law should be administered according to the religion of Christ and not according to the old Mosaic law which called for an eye for an eye and a tooth for a tooth.

"If you convicted all in the courtroom who have toted a little liquor in the last few years," he said, "there wouldn't be anybody left but

Your Honor and one or two others," Colonel Kirkpatrick declared that the justice of the law was on trial.

Retracts Criticisms

Judge Williams said, in passing sentence on Mr. Jimison, that the state had been ably represented. The facts were that the whole plea of the defense was for clemency, and no evidence was introduced by Mr. Jimison's attorneys to show that the accused was innocent of the charges against him at the former trial.

Immediately after Judge Williams had announced the sentence of the court, Mr. Morrison arose and stated that, in behalf of his client, he wished to state that Mr. Jimison wished to withdraw all of his criticisms of the police. Mr. Jimison had testified on the stand that he had not been treated courteously at the time of his arrest.

The only incident of particular interest in the examination of witnesses for the defense was the statement by Rev. R. O. Eller, Methodist minister, who succeeded Mr. Jimison as pastor of a church in Spencer. Mr. Eller stated that since he had known the accused he had considered that his character was good and that he still thought so.

J. P. Dorset, the first witness for the defense, testified that he was connected with the postoffice at Spencer at the present time and had been mayor of Spencer for two years and recorder of that city for two years. He said he had known the accused for five years and had considered his character good.

B. L. Young, the next witness, said that he is in the automobile business in Spencer and was chairman of the board of stewards of Mr. Jimison's church in that city. He also testified that Mr. Jimison's character was good.

J. A. Wagstaff, policeman of Spencer stated that he considered the

character of the accused good.

Ministers Testify

Rev. George D. Herman, pastor of the Dilworth Methodist church, when called to the stand, stated that he had known the accused from 1917 to 1919 and considered his character good.

Rev. R. H. Daugherty, pastor of the Hawthorne Lane Methodist church, said that he had known Mr. Jimison for 12 years and had thought him a good man.

Rev. J. H. Barnhardt, pastor of Tryon Street Methodist church, said on the stand that he has known Mr. Jimison for 16 years and has believed his character to have been good.

Ralph Simmerson, 17 year old youth of Spencer, president of a boy's club of Mr. Jimison's church while in Spencer, and Eugene Lowder, also of Spencer, testified to Mr. Jimison's character.

Rev. J. B. Craven, presiding elder of the Charlotte district of the Methodist church, was the last character witness. He said that he had known the accused for 12 years and had considered his character good.

The trial lasted for three hours, practically all of the crowd which thronged the courtroom remaining until Judge Williams had announced the decision of the court.
