FOREST FIRE DESTROYS FIVE THOUSAND ACRES

Foot-hills of Blue Ridge Near Elkin Devastated by Flames for Many Miles

Elkin, April 9.—The most destructive forest fire ever known in this section of country swept over 5,000 acres of land yesterday in the foot-hills of the Blue ridge, adjacent to Mountain Park and Kapps Mills, in this county. The value of fine timber totally destroyed by the flames as they leaped and spread from hill to hill throughout the day and far into the night could hardly be estimated.

Hundreds of men for miles around fought as they had never fought before in their efforts to conquer the flames, which were not only wrecking destruction to their valuable trees but threatening many of the splendid country homes and churches of the community. The Baptist church building at Rockyford, near Kapps Mills, was saved only by the most heroic work of the citizens of the vicinity. Citizens of Elkin who rushed to the scene to render assistance describe the forest fire as the most spectacular ever witnessed. At times a dozen different blazes being visible from the tall hill tops.

SPECIAL TERM TO TRY NEEDLEMAN MUTILATORS

About 30 Arrests Have Been Made in Connection With Williamston Mob Incident.

Raleigh, April 9.—Governor McLean today called a special term of court for Martin county May 4 for the trial of persons charged with the mutilation of Joseph Needleman N. A. Sinclair will be the presiding judge.

About 30 arrests have already been made since Needleman was taken from the jail at Williamston and horribly mutilated by a mob. Solicitor Donald Gilliam is directing an investigation that is expected to result in further arrests, and the state and county of Martin have made reward offers of \$400 for each person convicted of participating in the mob.

In making the offer for the state, Governor McLean specified that those apprehended should be delivered to the warden of the state prison, otherwise the reward money would not be paid. Prison authorities said tonight that none of those arrested had been brought here.

SHOT BY GATE-KEEPER GETS \$17,500 VERDICT

Town of Clarksville Loses In Suit Brought by Granville County Man.

Richmond, Va., April 10.—Robert J. Sanford, young farmer of Granville county, North Carolina, was today awarded a verdict of \$17,500 in Federal court in his \$25,000 damage suit against the town of Clarksville, Virginia, growing out his being shot in the back of his head with a rifle by Duff Murphy, toll gate keeper at a bridge owned by that town. Sanford was shot while undertaking to cross the bridge without paying toll. Murphy, he testified, was busy collecting toll from other persons when he passed and it was his intention to pay double fare when he returned. He was on his way to see Miss Maude Gregory, of Mecklenburg county, his fiancée. Because of his injury, he has been unable to carry out his plans to be married, being subject to spasms since he was shot. Counsel for the town argued today that Murphy in firing the shot acted in the capacity of policeman and not as toll gate keeper and consequently the town was not liable.

Murphy fled after the shooting and is still a fugitive from justice. It was testified at the time that he had previously shot at tourists on the bridge on several occasions.

Reno Business Man Calls Mother on Long Distance

Long Distance calls of hundreds of miles are not even novel today, a fact proven by Otis Fulk, of Reno, Nevada, a few days ago, when he called up his mother, Mrs. L. A. Fulk, of High Point. She heard his voice as easily and clearly as if they had been conversing in the same room. Mr. Fulk who has made his home in Reno for about eight years, is one of the leading merchants of that city.

Ford to Establish Plant Five Miles From Heart of Paris

Detroit, April 11. Edsel B. Ford today confirmed reports from Paris, that the Ford Motor company has acquired property and buildings for the establishment of an assembly plant at the French capital. Additions and alterations will be started immediately with production to begin about August 1, Mr. Ford said. The property embraces approximately 16 acres and is located on the Seine river about five miles from the heart of the city.

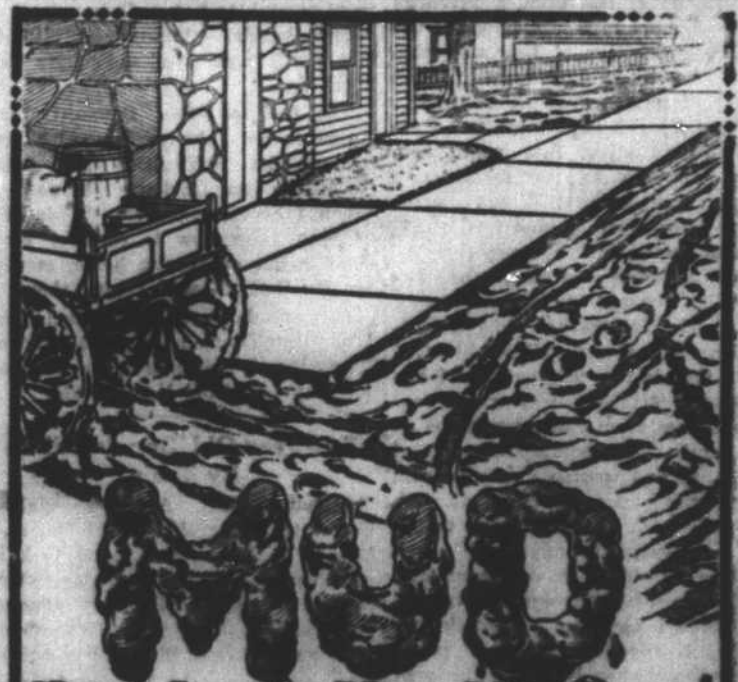
