ELECTION CONSPIRACY LITIGATION IS ENDED

It Was Alleged That Voters Were Not Permitted to Vote But They Were Illiterate.

Jefferson, May 2.—A very interesting and largely attended hearing was held before United States Commissioner P. T. McNeill on Thursday, in which J. W. Duncan and Fred G. Ray, of Olds Fields township, were defendants, charged with conspiracy to prevent citizens from voting for a congressional candidate in the 1924 election. Mr. Ray and Mr. Duncan were registrar and judge of election, respectively, in that election.

Attorney Bauguess, Jefferson, had issued the warrant while he was still United States commissioner. But at the hearing he was assisted by A. E. Holton, of Winston-Salem, in a vigorous prosecution, but a prosecution which the commissioner found was not backed by evidence.

Attorneys Bowie, Austin, and Johnston appeared for the defendants. Several witnesses were introduced by the prosecution who testified that they were challenged and not permitted to vote in the election. But without exception, they admitted that they were unable to read and write. Messrs. Holton and Bauguess made a strenuous effort to get the commissioner to extend the benefits of the grandfather clause beyond 1908 and make it effective to protect illiterate voters registering in 1924; but after Mr. Bowie had read the statutes and certain sections of the constitution, the court refused to do so, and discharged the defendants.

Youth Accidentally Killed by Hanging.

Wharton, N. J., May 1.—While doing stunts on a trapeze for the benefit of a juvenile audience here in the barn of his home, Theodore J. Bray, 15, accidentally tied a knot around his neck with a rope supporting an end of the bar and hung until he died, in full view of the spectators. The children left him there, not knowing he was dead, and it was three hours before the tragedy was discovered.
