Alumnae Will Endow A Chair In Honor of Mrs. Lucy Robertson

The alumnae of Greensboro College proposes to endow the Chair of Religious Education in honor of Mrs. Lucy Robertson, who was the first woman president of a college in the South. Of the \$100,000 that the alumnae proposes to raise for the endowment of Greensboro College, \$50,000 is to go to the Lucy Robertson endowment fund.

The endowment of a chair in her honor serves a double purpose in strengthening the college and in establishing a memorial to a woman whose life has been one of devoted service. It is a consummation which has long been cherished by all of the close friends of the college, it is with general pleasure that we may now look to see it realized."

Mrs. Robertson retired from her office as president March 21, 1912, and was immediately appointed president emerita. Since that time she has been in charge of the chair of religious education which will henceforth bear her name, when the plans of the alumnae have matured.—N. C. Christian Advocate.

Notice Street Improvement Bonds.

Be it ordained by the Board of Commissioners of the Town of Mount Airy, N. C.

1. Bonds of the Town of Mount Airy shall be issued for the purpose of constructing or reconstructing streets in said town of brick blocks, sheet asphalt, bitulite or bituminous concrete laid on a solid foundation or of concrete.

2. The maximum aggregate principal amount of the bonds shall be \$25,000.00.

3. A tax sufficient to pay the principal and interest of the bonds shall be annually levied and collected.

4. A statement of the debt of the town has been filed with the clerk and is open to public inspection.

5. The bonds are for local improvements of which at least one fourth of the cost exclusive of the cost of paving at street intersections has been or is to be especially assessed and this ordinance shall take effect upon its passage and shall not be submitted to the voters.

The foregoing ordinance was passed on the 28th day of April, 1925, and was first published on the 30th day of April, 1925.

Any action or proceeding questioning the validity of said ordinance must be commenced within 30 days after its first publication.
