ARMY AND NAVY DOINGS.

The Movements of Our Army and Navy Breiffy Told.

Blds have been opened at the Navy Department for the construction of four harbor defense vessels of the monitor type, anthorized by Congress at an expenditure of \$1,750,000 for each monitor In type, they have no duplicates in modern ship construction, and more than anything also resemble the little monitors which dodinguished them lelves in the civil war. While revent new vessels will be vastly superior to them in actual power. Their speed, for instance, will be 21 knots, about double that of the old vessels. SENATOR QUAY UNDER ARREST.


