**Medical Leaders Discuss Infantile Paralysis—No Cure Found.**

New York, July 13.—Leaders in the medical profession, public health experts from many other cities, philanthropists and charity workers thronged the rooms of the Academy of Medicine here tonight to attend a mass meeting for the discussion of infantile paralysis, the plague which has brought death into hundreds of homes here in the past few weeks.

Those who hoped that a cure for the disease would be heralded or that isolation of its deadly germ would be announced, were disappointed. Dr. Simon Flexner, of the Rockefeller institute, for medical research, and other experts told of the progress made by medical science in combatting the disease, but they had no epoch-marking discoveries to proclaim. He declared, however, that there is no occasion for panic and that the death rate from infantile paralysis is lower even than from other maladies considered far less serious.

Dr. Haven Emerson, health commissioner of this city, told what is being done to fight the epidemic and asserted the widespread alarm which parents feel is not justified. He said that out of 2,600 suspected cases investigated only 1,640 true cases of infantile paralysis had been found, of which 308 resulted fatally.

**Another Woman Promoted.**

Raleigh, July 13.—J. J. Mackey, Jr., who has been executive clerk in the offices of Governor Craig for nearly three years, has resigned that position to accept an offer from a typewriter company. He will be succeeded in the governor's office by Miss Mamie Turner, who has held a position for quite a while in the department of state, as stenographer.

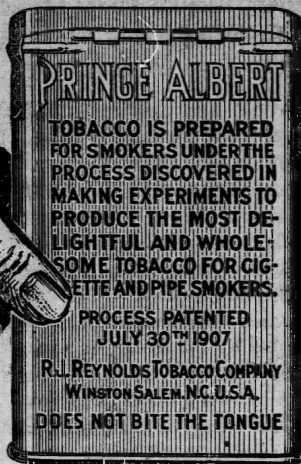
