ANNUAL MEETING FARMERS' UNION

President Alexander in Annual Address Recommends Progressive Measures.

Raleigh, Nov. 15.—In opening the annual session of the North Carolina Farmers' Union here today President H. Q. Alexander, of Mecklenburg, delivered a strenuous address in which he declared for such progressive measures as the abolition of the electoral college in the selection of the president of the United States and his election direct by the people of the whole country; government ownership of railroads and other transportation facilities; initiative and referendum for all public officials, especially in the state and county, including governor and judges; commission government for counties, free public school books published by the state and a general reformation of the money system of the country.

President Alexander believes the time is ripe for the government to secure controlling interest in all the transportation lines of the country and that this would prove a great benefit and protection to not only farmers but to all classes of the people. He made a special plea for co-operation among the farmers and expressed the view that this should extend to the purchase of all supplies and farming machinery and that it should especially be obligatory on the members of the Farmers' Union to observe this co-operative spirit and practice to the letter in all his relations with the public. He advocated public county meetings at the county seats under the auspices of the unions with the townspeople in attendance with the farmers to get together on co-operative relations in the sale of perishable farm products direct to the people of the towns.

Dr. Alexander urged that the farmers make sure of raising their home supplies and declared that the local land loan association now being formed under the auspices of the Farmers' Union and the federal land loan banking system are sure to prove a great boon to the farmers.

FARMERS NAME OLD OFFICERS.

The second day of the meeting was featured by the re election of all officers and selecting the following named delegates to the national convention at Palatka, Fla., November 21: Dr. H. Q. Alexander, W. R. Dixon, Clarence Poe and J. Z. Greene; alternates: W. R. Hobbs, W. B. Griffin, A. F. Yarbrough and J. C. Kennett. The Union adopted the report from the executive committee, which declared for fullest advancement in practical education for farm life and a compulsory attendance school law, endorsed the race segregation in rural land ownership and an amendment to the State constitution for initiative and referendum.
