Marion, the trustees of Marion General Hospital announced today. The \$700,000 non-profit institution will cost the county less than one-third actual construction costs, according to W. L. Morris, chairman of the hospital trustees.

"If \$100,000 can be raised by McDowell county, plus the funds on hand, the state and federal governments will give us the rest," added Morris.

The government grants, available under terms of the Medical Care Commission's Good Health Program of Hospital construction, will meet over two-thirds of the building cost, or about \$450,000, if the county's S.
