BOARD OF ALDERMEN ADOPT ZONING ORDINANCE

Plan Will Provide For Uniform Growth Of Town Of Marion

The Board of Aldermen in session Tuesday night adopted a zoning ordinance creating and setting up a zoning commission as the first step in zoning the Town of Marion. The commission will be appointed by the Board.

The purpose of the plan is to provide for a uniform growth of the Town, limiting the building of business and industrial establishments in the area designated for that purpose.

A tract of 25 acres of Mackey's Creek was purchased to be used in connection with the water system. The Town pipe line crosses this (Continued on last page)
