### A Mistaken Idea.

Our comment last week in regard to the arrest made for illegally selling whiskey seems to have made the impression on the minds of some of our citizens that we are disposed to uphold the violators of the law. There was never a more mistaken idea. We heartily endorse every legitimate means that may be used to suppress the sale of liquor in Maxton, and we have all along urged the rigid enforcement of the law. We shall emphasize that upon all occasions. Our criticism last week was intended to apply only to the METHODS employed in those particular cases. If there are those who dissent from us in that—why, we can't help it. THE UNION will never stultify itself by publicly endorsing what it privately condemns.

PRESIDENT POLK, of the Farmers' Alliance, made this declaration in his recent speech at Goldsboro:

"Those who wish to oppose any principle of the Alliance will have to get out and join the enemy."

Whom does Cousin Leonadis consider "the enemy?" Surely not the Democratic party, for it has endorsed every demand of the Alliance except the sub-treasury plan. If Col. Polk attempts to read out of the Alliance every member who is opposed to that impracticable scheme, the ranks of the order will be greatly decimated. The Alliance is not strong enough just yet to "go it alone," even if all its membership could be held together in the formation of a new party. But that cannot be done. Fully one half—probably two thirds—of the members of the Alliance have a strong predilection for and an abiding faith in the Democratic party, and they will not jeopardize their best interests by cutting loose from it to secure the enactment of a law which many of the wisest and inflexible to the public welfare. There is no fight between the Democratic party and the Alliance, and but little difference in the ends to be attained. What differences that exist can be easily settled by reasonable concessions on the part of both, and we are sure the Democratic party will meet the Alliance more than half way. The Statesville Landmark very pertinently says: "To be sure, the men who go into the Democratic conventions next year must go in as Democrats, else Democrats cannot fellowship with them. It will not do for aliens to be allowed to capture the organization and pervert it by declarations for sub-treasury and other anti-Democratic schemes; but an understanding, we are quite sure, peaceable if not satisfactory, will be arrived at in due time, by which Democrats will hold their conventions and Third party men theirs, though if all men heretofore Democrats are not in the Democratic conventions next year, prepared to renew their allegiance to Democratic principles and pledged to support Democratic nominees, it must not be the fault of the party."

It is reported that Mr. Ramsay, who was at one time associate editor of the Progressive Farmer, is to assume editorial management with the next issue. The Charlotte Chronicle says "he is but little short of an anarchist and if he can create a Third Party or raise the devil he will do it." During his former connection with the Farmer Mr. Ramsay made many enemies by his severe criticisms of Senator Vance, and his immoderate expressions on many public questions. The fact is, he wrote himself down an ass, and justifies the estimate placed upon by the Chronicle.
