Fire Sufferers—Special Notice.

A relief committee has been organized to assist the sufferers from the forest fires in the settlements contiguous to Pinehurst. This committee requests that all applicants for aid be sent to them; or that all persons aiding any of these families will kindly notify the committee so that aid shall not be duplicated except when necessary. Miss Gilbert of the relief committee will be in Mr. Benbow's front office from 10 to 12 a. m., and from 3 to 5 p. m. every day (except Sunday) until further notice, to receive contributions of bedding, clothing and provisions. She will also provide for needy persons and families during these same hours. Money for the purchase of necessary supplies may be handed to Messrs. Tobey, Spinney and Jenney; or to Miss Upham, at the post office, and Miss Drew, treasurer of the relief committee. New cases of destitution are constantly being brought to the notice of the committee. Every contribution will be judiciously expended and distributed.
