### PROMINENT GOLFERS.

**Mr. E. A. Freeman, of the Montclair Golf Club, New Jersey.**

THE PINEHURST OUTLOOK prints this week, the first of a series of portraits—Prominent Golfers at Pinehurst—with Mr. E. A. Freeman, of the Montclair Golf Club, New Jersey, as the subject. Mr. Freeman has spent several winters at Pinehurst, and is now at The Carolina for the season.

He has been prominent in amateur events about New York City, for three years past, and is generally regarded as a coming man; a dangerous opponent at either medal or match play. His form is clean-cut and graceful and his game—driving, approaching and putting—is characterized by general excellence and steadiness. He holds a record of seventy-seven on the Pinehurst course, and has recently made two rounds in eighty.

His handicap in the State (New Jersey) championship was two, and in the Metropolitan, eight.

### NEW SMOKING ROOM.

**Men are Enjoying New Quarters at The Holly Inn.**
