Mr. Charles W. Kay of Philadelphia, was a visitor during the week.

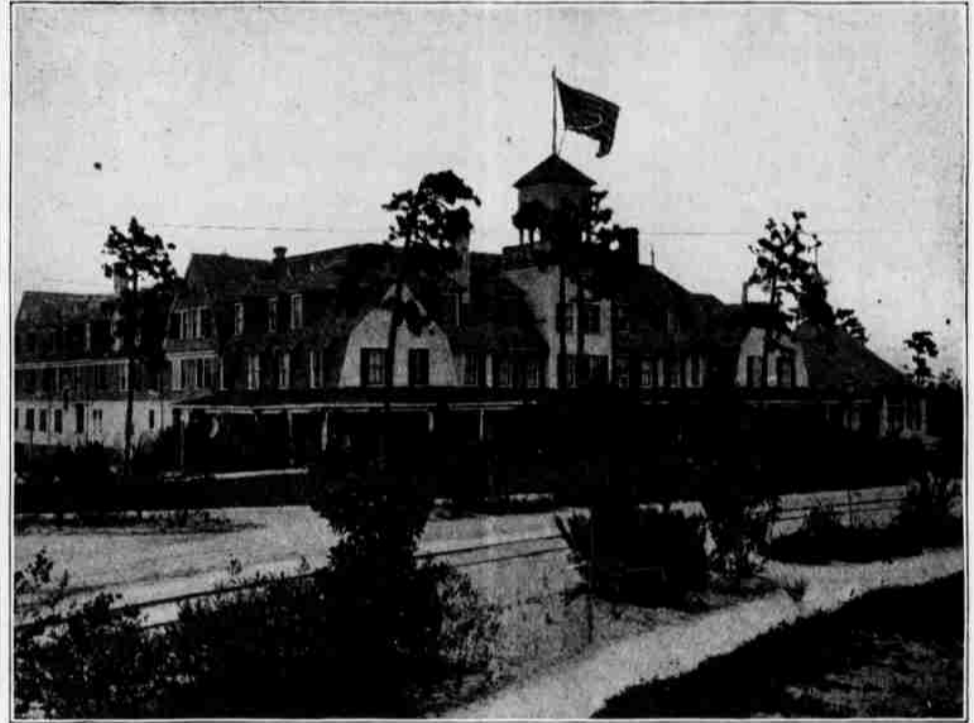
Mrs. G. F. Baright of New York, spent a few days here recently.

Mr. and Mrs. W. A. Johnson of Latrobe, Pa., come to remain several months.

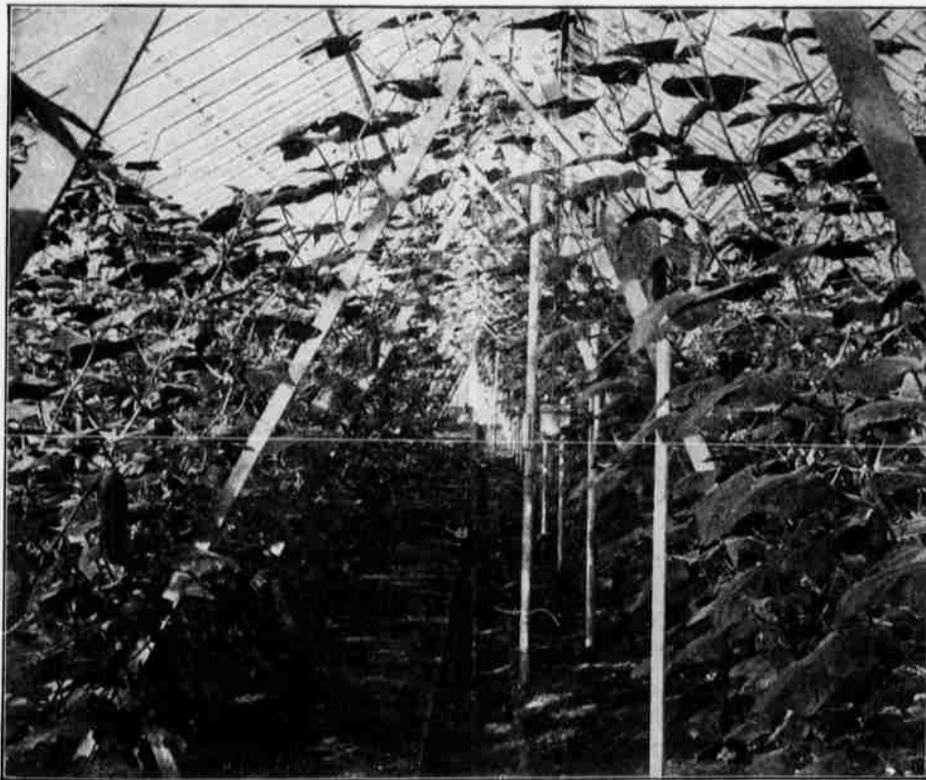
THE HOLLY INN
