## TIED ON THIRTY-SIX HOLES!

### Ross-Hobens Match Brings Amateur Championship to Brilliant End.

#### A. H. Fenn Wins Third-Pace Hit Too Fast for Travis Who Finished Fourth.

A THIRTY-SIX-HOLE tie play-off between Professionals Alec Ross of the Pinehurst Golf Club and the Woodland Park Club, Auburndale, Mass., and Jack Hobens of the Yountakah Club, New York, was a spectacular feature of the medal play open Southern championship event which brought the week's program of the United North and South Amateur Championship tournament to a brilliant close Saturday.

On the morning round Ross made an eighty-one, but he made a magnificent rally in the afternoon, doing a seventy-one, and tying with Hobens at 152. In a sixteen-hole tie play-off he won out with five strokes to his credit, a total score for the fifty-two holes of 221, against 226.
