The raising of fodder and garden vegetables which was so successfully carried on last summer, will be continued upon a larger scale this year and with increased results.

The Poultry Farm is making rapid rowth and becoming more and more an important factor in the food supply problem, and the equipment is being rapidly increased.

The Market Garden is giving larger returns each year.

Single Stroke Wins Trophy in Saturday's Medal Play Event.


