

# TRAVIS WINS ON LAST HOLB 

Fownes Gives Him Close Call in Exceptionally Brilliant Match.

Medal Play Scoren Were One Fiftysix and One Fifty-Eight and ThirtyNixth Hole Decided the Match
 ATURDAY'S thirty-six hole final round in the Second Anuual Midwinter Tournament, between Walter J. Travis, the British champion, and W. C. Fownes, Jr., of Pittsburg, was the most brilliant golf ever seen here, and it is generally conceded that the champion had one of the narrowest escapes of his long and somewhat spectacular career.
At the end of the morning round with medal play scores of 75 and 77 , respectively, the Pittsburg player had his distinguished opponent two down, and the news spread like wildfire drawing a gallery of several hundred people to the course before the time of starting on the afternoon round, and many followed the match from beginning to end, witnessing a stroke for stroke contest that was umcertain until the finish.
Travis took the nineteenth hole, halved the twentieth and twenty-first, evening matters on the twenty-second, and gained a lead on the 25th, and though the score was even up several times afterward, the Pittsburger never again regained a lead.
The climax came on the 35th hole where Travis laid his opponent a dead stymie, but the Pittsburger Englished his ball so that it described a circle around the ball, halving the hole in three. On the 36th hole Fownes returned the compliment, but Travis had two for a halve and was not seriously inconvenienced, halving the hole and winning by one up.
