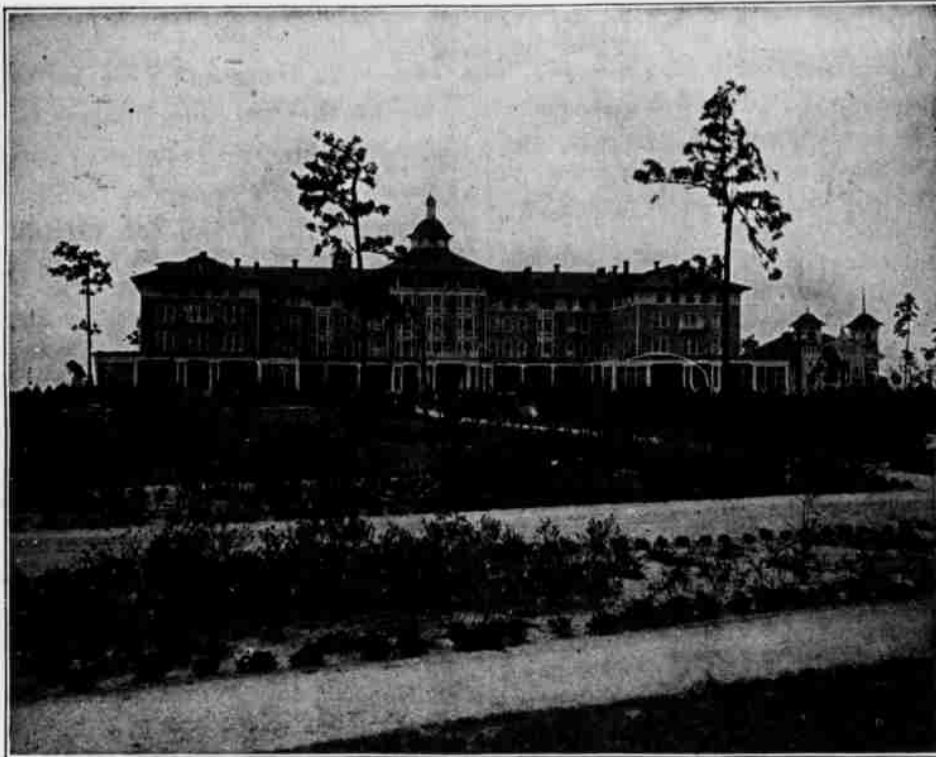


# THE CAROLINA
