HE Tin Whistles Match Play Club Championship Tournament, which ended early in the week, proved the most interesting of the informal events


of the season, J. D. Foot, Rye, N. Y., winning the final round from Allan Lard, of the Columbia Golf Club, Washington,


The medal play scores for the eighteen holes were eighty-three each, and eightyeight for Foot, and eighty-nine for Lard for the nineteenth.
