

THEY TOOK ELEVEN FIRSTS

Pinehurst's Utility Plant Exhibits Win Prizes at Raleigh Fair.

Excellence of Blooded Stock and Fancy Poultry Attracts Attention of Entire State.

PRODUCTS of Pinehurst's crack utility plants, the Dairy, Piggery and Poultry Farm, had things much their own way at the North Carolina State Fair, held at Raleigh, last month, winning first in every class entered.

General Marigold, patriarch of the dairy herd, carried off the blue ribbon for the best bull shown, and the piggery first for the best Berkshire boar two years old and under, the best boar one year old and under and the best sow one year old and under, and had the "combinations" been known at entrance, two more prizes would have been secured.

The Poultry Farm walked away with seven of the first prizes, won in a variety of classes.

The presence of President Roosevelt during the fair, made the event the most important in history both in the standard of the exhibits shown and the attendance, and Pinehurst's exhibits attracted favorable attention from fancy breeders from all portions of the state and many parts of the country.

The reputation of these departments is gradually extending and creating a steady and increasing demand for their products. The summer has marked a satisfactory sale of hogs and many inquiries are being received, not only concerning this department, but the fancy poultry as well.
