

## MISS MIX WINS GOLD MEDAL MAKES ALL GOOD NATURED

Makes Ninety-three in Women's Championship Qualification.

Mrs. Paterson Second in Ninety-four and Miss Dutton Third With Ninety-seven.



THE SIXTH annual United North and South amateur championship tournament began Thursday with an eighteen hole qualification round in the women's event, one division of eight qualifying for the match play rounds for the championship trophy.

The feature of the day's play was a pretty contest for the possession of the gold medal offered for the best score, between Miss Julia R. Mix of Englewood, and Mrs. Myra D. Paterson of Baltusrol, Miss Mix winning with ninety-three and a single stroke. Miss Mary C. Dutton of Oakley, the title holder, was third with ninety-seven.
