L. A. Hamilton Wins Gross Trophy With Eighty-four Card and Three Strokes Margin.



HE annual handicap of the Championship tournament drew a record field, its special feature being a tie for the first cup, between C. E. Cam-

eron of Baltusrol, whose handicap was fourteen, and A. P. K. James of London, whose allowance was ten, Mr. Cameron winning the play-off.

The battle for the gold medal offered for the best gross score was a pretty one, L. A. Hamilton of Englewood, winning with a card of eighty-four and a margin of three strokes, Mr. James being his nearest opponent. W. K. Wood of the Homewood Club, winner of the amateur championship, was next with eightyeight, and L. E. Wardwell of Megunticook, and Edwin A. Freeman of Montclair, tied for fourth position at eightynine. George E. Morse of the Rutland Country Club, and William C. Freeman of Montclair, made ninety each, and C. L. Becker of Woodland, ninety-two.

A high wind which made the putting greens "impossible" was responsible for the high scores.
