Popular with Visitors.

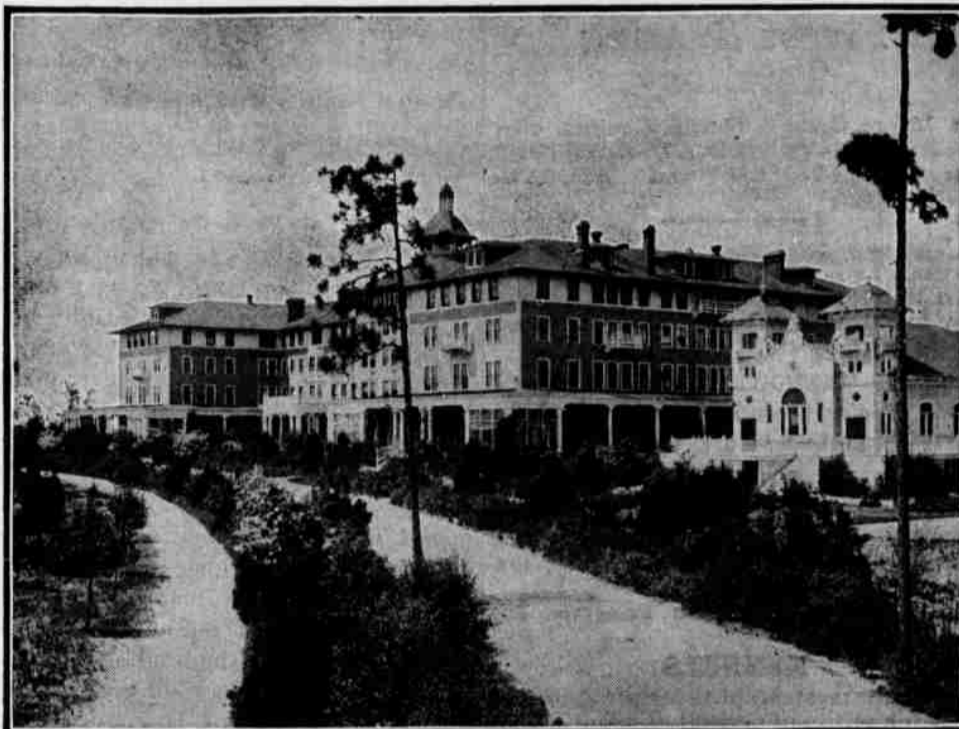

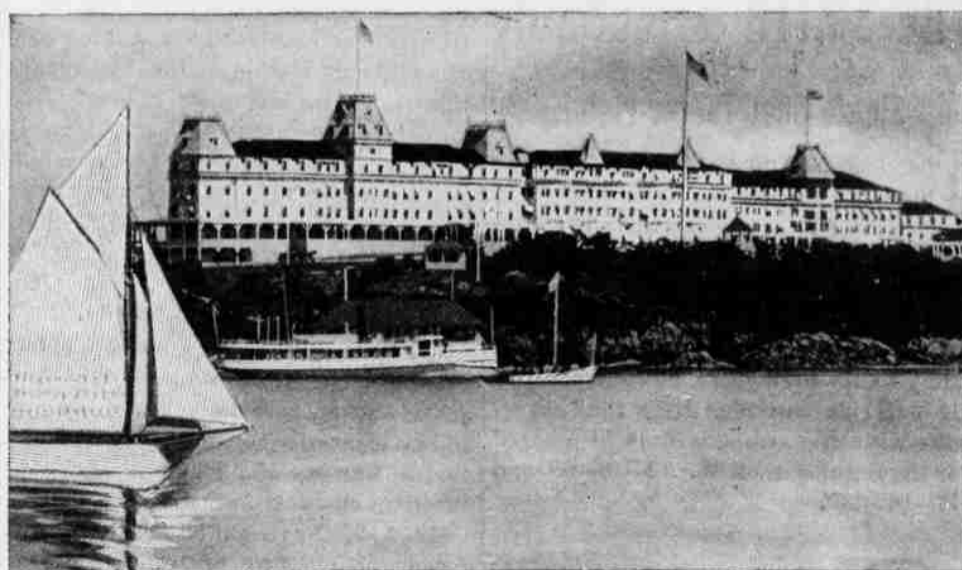
