Mr. and Mrs. William R. Waters of Philadelphia return for their annual visit.

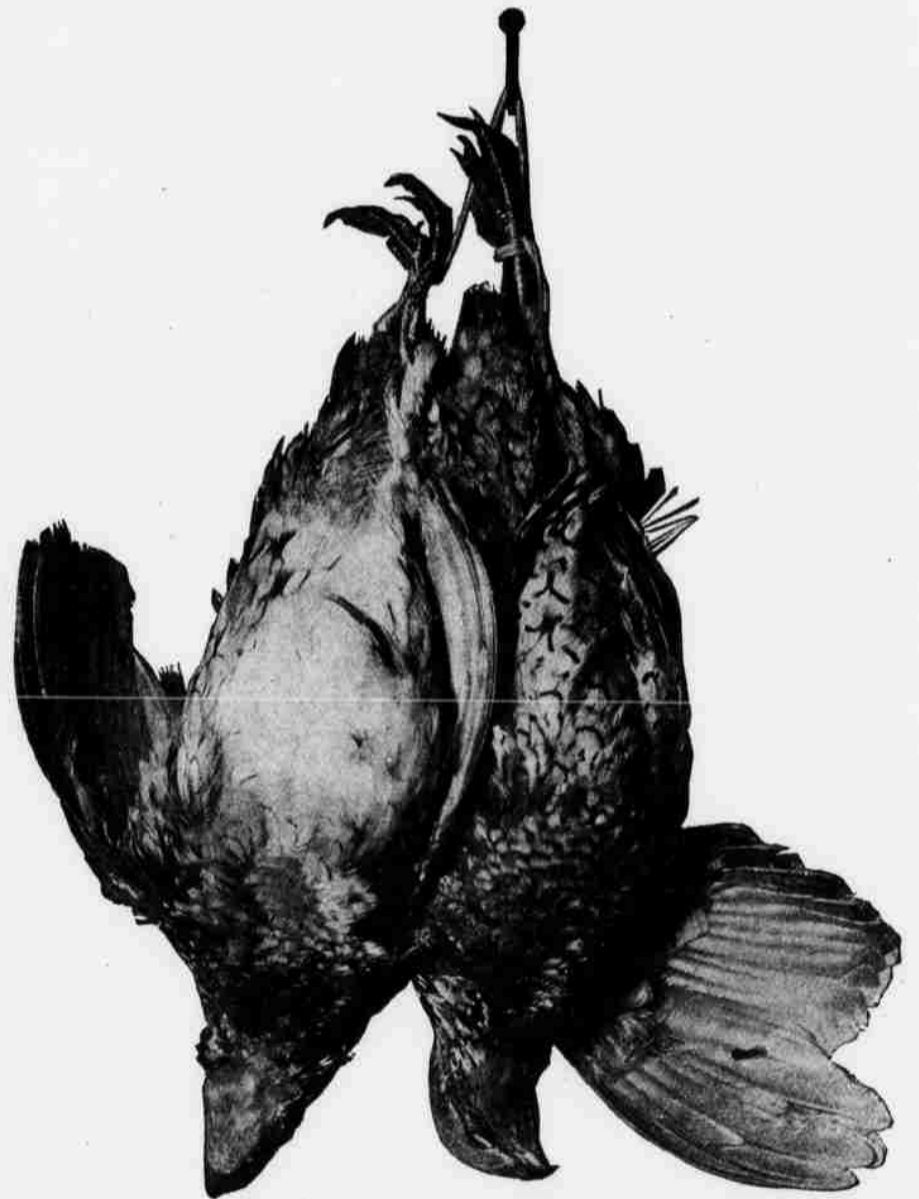
