ELEVENTH ANNUAL UNITED NORTH AND SOUTH CHAMPIONSHIP—(Women)—March 22, 24, 25, 26, 27.—Gold medal for the best qualification score, Championship, Governors', Secretary's and Treasurer's cups to division winner, and runners-up in eights.

THIRD ANNUAL "UNITED" AMATEUR-PROFESSIONAL—(Four-ball, best ball)—March 28.—Cup for amateur in leading pair, one hundred, fifty and twenty-five dollars to leading professionals.

THIRTEENTH ANNUAL "UNITED" OPEN CHAMPIONSHIP—(36 holes, medal play,)—March 28.—Championship gold medal and one hundred dollars to winner, fifty dollars to second and twenty-five to third, with twenty-five dollars for the best eighteen-hole round.

THIRTEENTH ANNUAL UNITED NORTH AND SOUTH AMATEUR CHAMPIONSHIP—March 31, April 1, 2, 3, 4, 5.—Championship gold medal for the best qualification score, Championship, Governors', Secretary's, Treasurer's, Captain's and Club cups to division winners, sterling cups to division runners-up and consolation winners.

FIFTH ANNUAL MID-APRIL—April 10, 11, 12.—Sterling cup for the best qualification score, President's and Governors' cups to division winners, silver medals to division runners-up and consolation winners.
