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Miss Florence Harvey Wins Women's
Event of Pinehurst's Classic



FOR THE first time in the history of Pinehurst's United North and South Championship a trophy crosses into Canadian territory; Thursday's final in the annual women's event of the United North and South, a fitting climax to a notable event. ¶ Throughout the contest which claimed the attention of a gallery of several hundred people, Mrs. R. H. Barlow of Merion, the American representative, Eastern Champion and twice runner-up in the National, was on the defensive. Her superb rally, however, gave an element of uncertainty to the last holes and developed brilliant play in which Miss Florence L. Harvey, former Canadian and present Ontario Champion, won the supremacy, a halved hole on the home green deciding the match.

The outward journey developed close play, but little that was spectacular. The first hole was halved in 6, Mrs. Barlow's second shot making the trap. Likewise she was in difficulty on the second and the third with a win and a lose in 6-5. Both found traps on the way to the fourth which a twelve-foot putt won for Miss Harvey, who also took the fifth, 5-6, and the sixth, 3-4. An indifferent 8 by Miss Harvey, gave the seventh to Mrs. Barlow in 6, and the Merion golfer took the eighth in a par 3 to a poor 6 for the Canadian who made the trap on her tee shot. Miss Harvey, however, rallied for a 3-4 win on the ninth and made the turn two up.

The tenth was perfectly played in 4 each and Miss Harvey became four up with wins in 5-6 each on the next two holes, Mrs. Barlow's second on the twelfth making the trap. Failure to run down a five-foot putt on the thirteenth green cost Mrs. Barlow a win and she halved in 6, Miss Harvey making the trap on her third. A brilliant second and approach shot turned the tide in Mrs. Barlow's favor on the fourteenth which she won 4-6, and likewise on the fifteenth she laid an approach dead to the hole and went down in 4 to 5 for Miss Harvey, whose tee shot landed in a trap. Maintaining her lead on the sixteenth with a halve in a fine 5, Mrs. Barlow won the seventeenth, 4-5, to make the score dormie one, with a fine recovery from a tee shot which made the trap at the front of the green. Mrs. Barlow had the honor on the eighteenth and sent a beauty straight down the course, Miss Harvey following suit. The Canadian was away and her second landed just short of the trap guarding the green at the left, a topped brassie by Mrs. Barlow stopping not far from Miss Harvey's ball. Both made the green in 3, requiring two putts each and halving in 5. ¶ The enthusiasm was spontaneous, for the tension of the last holes of the contest was great. ¶ The cards :

In the semi-final Miss Harvey won by 3 and 2 from Mrs. William West of Philadelphia. Four up at the turn, Miss Harvey lost the tenth and eleventh, won the twelfth, halved the thirteenth, lost the fourteenth, won the fifteenth and the match with a halve on the sixteenth. ¶ Mrs. Barlow's win was also 3 and 2, and her opponent, Mrs. J. Raymond Price, one time winner of the United. The pair were all even at the turn, Mrs. Barlow losing the first, winning the second, third and fourth, losing the fifth, sixth and seventh, halving the eighth and winning the ninth. Gaining the lead on the tenth, Mrs. Barlow lost the eleventh and twelfth, but took the next four holes for the match in 4-5, 5-6, 3-5 and 5-6. In the first round Miss Harvey scored 6 and 5 in play with Miss Sarah P. Evans of Tedesco, and Mrs. Barlow was 8 and 7 over Miss Louise B. Elkins of Oakmont, one time winner of the United.

Keen play ruled from final rounds in the remaining three divisions. In the second, Miss Agnes Blancke of Montclair was 2 up and 1 to play in her match with Mrs. J. G. Ridout of Lambton. ¶ In the third, Miss Dorothy Ballantyne of Detroit and Mrs. A. A. Uebelacker of Hackensack were nip and tuck to the home green where the New Jersey player won. ¶ In the fourth, Miss Priscilla Beall of Uniontown defeated Mrs. C. S. Waterhouse of Hackensack by 2 up. ¶ Mrs. Barlow was the winner of the qualification gold medal with a card of ninety and a margin of five strokes over Mrs. Price and Mrs. J. V. Hurd of Oakmont, International Champion as Dorothy Campbell. ¶ The cards :
