FOURTEENTH ANNUAL UNITED NORTH AND SOUTH CHAMPIONSHIP-(Women)-March 25 to 30-Gold medal for best qualification score, Championship, Governors', Secretary's and Treasurer's cups to division winners and sterling cups to runners-up in eights.

SIXTH ANNUAL "UNITED" OPEN AMA-TEUR PROFESSIONAL-(Four ball, best ball)-March 31-Cup for amateur in feading pair, one hundred, fifty and twenty-five dollars for leading professional score.

SIXTEENTH ANNUAL "UNITED" OPEN CHAMPIONSHIP-April 1-Championship gold medal and one hundred dollars to winner, fifty dollars to second, and twenty-five dollars to third with special prize of twenty-five dollars for the best eighteen hole round.
