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You can't know too much about the shells you shoot. The information you should have is easy to obtain for it is told on the shell itself. The two ends give the story.

On the base you will of course find the name of the maker and the loader of the shell, and the guage. At the other end, on the top wad, are printed the size and quantity of shot, the quantity of powder and, last but not least-the name of the powder.
