TENTH ANNUAL MID-APRIL TOURNAMENT.—April 16, 17, 18, 19, 20.—Qualifying round and finals, eighteen holes. Sterling Trophy for best qualification score; President's Trophy to winner of first sixteen; Governors' Trophy to winner of second sixteen; Sterling Trophies to first division runner-up and consolation division winner in second division.

A woman's Putting Contest for a Silver Trophy is held every Saturday afternoon.
