A DESPERATE BATTLE

Marked Opening Matches of Midwinter Tennis Tournament

'As we go to press the battle for the Midwinter championship on the courts of the Pinehurst Country Club is still raging. The championship in the men's singles lies between Nathan Bundy, of Norfolk, and C. F. Watson, Jr., of West-

If the early stages of this contest are any criterion it should be a memorable occasion. The preliminary round brought forth some fast play, in which Watson smashed through the defense of J. W. Eggleston, of Norfolk, 6-4, 6-4, and George T. Aranyi, of New York, held W. K. Auchineloss, of Washington, down to 6-3, 6-4.

The second round brought out the fireworks. The longest and hardest and most evenly contested tennis match ever played in the Carolinas started shortly after lunch and was still raging with unabated fury when the sun began to sink in the West. The fifty-two games required for the three sets took the three hours to play, and at no stage of the proceedings were the two more than a game apart until the end of each set. Watson finally struggled over the line 8-10, 7-5, 12-10.

Meantime Bundy, of the great Tennis family, made his entrance into the final round by a clean cut victory over Roger Ward.

The first round found a surprise in store. Otto Salm, ranking high with the racquet, and from previous performance slated to win the tournament, met reverse at the hands of Roger Ward, of Montreal and in spite of a long reach and a hard driving game at the net, went down 3-6, 3-6.
