Yates wants to try it over again, on condition that Thomas rides his freak horse. Lucille sure doesn't need a jockey. The way she cut in across Kid Nelson's bows at the far corner, where she was comparatively safe from Col. Swigert's watchful eye, was a shame. But what are you going to do about it?
