The Honors in the Round Robin.

Trophy

In fact, Becker was 4 down to Kelley at the turn.

J. M. Robinson was best net, at 75, and annexed the prize for that department of the qualifying round.

The total permitted to qualify was 20, the Best Gross Four and four Handicap Fours. The ultimate winners in the respective Handicap Fours were S. H. Patterson, G. T. Dunlap, W. T. Barr and T. H. Hogsett.
