His whole game showed a lack of practice as he did not arrive in Pinehurst until the Saturday before the start of the event. However, Walker improved with each day's play until the finals, when he took F. S. Danforth of the North Fork Country Club into camp to the tune of seven to five.

Monday, December 29th, the Qualifying round was played with the Pinehurst system of classifying the players in effect. The large field of one hundred and thirty entries included several well-known players who yearly compete in this event as well as others who come from all over the country, as well as Canada, to strive for the beautiful trophies which were up for competition.
